

  - -> all children, regardless of background
  - -> coeducational: boys and girls
  - -> twelve year school
  - -> independent free school, minimum state interference



2000 + Kindergarten 1000 + schools (700 + in Europe) in 60 countries






#### Broad and versatile education

#### Major principles

Educational development suited to age

Respect for the inner impulses:

- > Develop sense of self worth
- > Looking for answers to individual questions

#### Learning phases

- 0-7: imitation, doing and creating a sense of trust and wonder
- 7-14: imagination, doing and creating a sense of beauty and pleasure to learn
- 14-21: thought, willpower, conscious feelings and creating a sense of truth and compassionate ideals



#### Are the goals reached?

Dr. Christian Pfeiffer Germany:

Xenophobic reactions 9th graders

Hauptschulen: 27 %

Gymnasia: 8,3 %

Steiner-Waldorfschools: 2,8%

"Macho" reactions 9th graders

Hauptschulen: 8,7 %

Gymnasia: 2 %

Steiner-Waldorfschools: 0,3 %

## "The Waldorf School - Cultivating humanity?"

Dr. Bo Dahlin, Sweden

Upper school Waldorf pupils felt to greater extent responsible for social and moral issues

Involvement in moral issues increased with age among Waldorf pupils, but was rather constant among the pupils in municipal schools.

### Why?

Aim of universal solidarity and openness to foreign cultures achieved as result of:

- -> special teaching methods
- -> Waldorf parents' values and social involvement.

#### Democratic perspective

Dr. Trond Solhaug, Norway

#### Higher scores on:

- tolerance and social engagement,
- interest in social issues and
- participation in future non-parliamentary political activity.

Municipal pupils scored higher on factual knowledge and on participation in future parliamentary elections.

Mitchell & Gerwin, North America

- Expresses high level of consciousness in making relationships work— at home and on job
- · Highly values tolerance of other viewpoint
- Cares about ethical principles and values helping others at work.
