



In 1982, the former High Master of Manchester Grammar School, Peter Mason, already retired, visited a number of Associations of Independent

These visits revealed how very little contact and knowledge national associations of independent schools had of their counterparts in other countries. Consequently, in 1988, Peter Mason initiated the founding of ECNAIS.

To bring together national associations of independent acrooks in European countries.


To assist its members in promoting understanding of the rights of pluralism in the national systems, of education and of parental choice of education for their children and of the





Historical institutionalism (HI)

is a <u>new institutionalist</u> social science method that uses <u>institutions</u> to find sequences of social, political, economic <u>behaviour</u> and <u>change</u> across time.

It is a comparative approach to the study of all aspects of human <u>organizations</u> and does so by relying heavily on case studies.
